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
Managing Solid Resources in Los Angeles



~750,000 single-family homes, small multifamily complexes (< 4 units), and City facilities



~65,000 medium and large multifamily complexes, condo buildings, and commercial businesses





The Plastics Problem

Globally:

- Less than 10% of plastics are recycled
- Over 6 billion metric tons of plastic in the environment

California:

- Primary source of land litter
- Threat to human health and wildlife
- Contribute to loss of tourism
- Diminish City aesthetics and recreation areas





Los Angeles's Zero Waste Goals & Commitments

- Increase landfill diversion
- Reduce per capita waste generation
- Phase out single-use plastics
- Eliminate organic waste from landfills
- Build a local circular economy





Why Source Reduction is Los Angeles's Focus

- Source reduction = most preferred option
- Recycling and composting still matter, but don't prevent waste creation
- Single-use plastics can be hard to recycle, often contaminate streams
- Prioritizing elimination over management

Scaling Reuse through Business Support

Reusable Foodware Microgrant Program

- April 2023 July 2024
- \$1M in financial and technical support
- Focus on environmental justice communities
- 120 food businesses transitioned
- Demonstrated beneficial outcomes:
 - Annual average cost savings
 - Significant waste reduction
 - Positive customer & business response







Three-phase Process

Priority Communities

P1

OUTREACH: 100% of all restaurants in Pacoima, Boyle Heights, South LA, Wilmington (613 businesses)

P2


ENGAGEMENT: Restaurants receive 1:1 engagement (3 attempts)

Key Takeaways & Next Steps

- Face-to-face engagement, needs assessment, and training are critical
- Samples of foodware options
- ~\$75/seat for conversion
- Developing summary document
- Considering expansion of program







Next Steps for 2025 & Beyond

- Ban on Single-use Printer Cartridges
- Reusable Foodware for Dine-in
- Recyclable or Compostable Single-use Takeout Foodware
- Water Bottle Refilling Station Expansion
- Reusable, Returnable Take-out Foodware Pilot









Proposed Single-Use Printer Cartridge Ban

- Prohibit sale of single-use printer cartridges within the City
- Not considered "single-use" if it meets all of the following:
 - Collected through a take-back program
 - o Remanufacturable, refillable, or reusable
 - Does not infringe upon intellectual property rights or violates applicable laws
- Applies to retail establishments and online retail establishments not a user-side ban








Lessons from Los Angeles's Plastic Reduction Work

- Start with education, enforce when necessary
- Engage stakeholders early and throughout the process
- Pair policy with funding and technical assistance
- Reuse is scalable with support
- Community trust takes time and consistency, leverage trusted networks
- Collaboration drives systemic change
